POSITIVE IMPACTS

In year one, the use of the ARP will avoid 8 million truck miles on Georgia roads

Moving freight by rail is 3 times more fuel efficient than moving freight by road

Estimated emissions reduction in year one: 16,038 tons of CO2 (80% reduction)

Fewer road miles decreases potential accidents

COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY

Since 2001, GPA has cut diesel use per TEU by 51%. By shifting from diesel to electric power for ship-to-shore cranes, refrigerated container racks and rubber-tired gantry cranes, the authority avoids the use of 5.8M gallons of diesel annually.



COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY


GPA is committed to operating in an efficient, environmentally respectful manner through initiatives such as:

Preserving 312 acres of wetlands that treat millions of gallons of water annually, and act as a habitat for diverse wildlife

Protecting old growth trees, two estimated to be more than 360 years old

Reducing light emissions and energy consumption by up to 60 percent with new lighting controls and fixtures

Protecting endangered species through efforts including a longtime partnership with the Caretta Research Project, which released 10,000 sea turtle hatchlings in 2015
