



Discovery Ahead


Steadily, the North Texas Hill Country around Nocona and Saint Jo has become a scenic destination for folks wishing to leave the urban life behind -- for a day or for a lifetime.

The best way to see the hill country is to drive it — whether it is with the convertible top down riding in the front seat of a classic car, on the back of your favorite motorcycle, or even while peddling your bike along the off-the-beaten path. In any case tour it!

There is plenty to do in the greater Nocona-Saint Jo area with three wineries, a brewery, unique shops, art galleries, five museums, historic sites and venues to draw your attention. A key to making the most of your visit to The North Texas Hill Country is knowing the best way to traverse the hills, creek bottoms and valleys, or skirt the fringes of the great prairie where the bison herds traveled as trails were later used by the drovers along the Chisholm Trail.

Whether you want to try the Wine Tour, find views of the Devil's Backbone, or swing through the undiscovered country down to Montague and Forestburg, your trip will be well worth it.





Settling the Hills of North Texas

The Taovayas Indians made this area their home as early as 1757, and the Wichita, Kiowa, Caddo and Comanche tribes all hunted the land for buffalo and other game.

Saint Jo, known as Head of Elm from 1849 to 1873, is the oldest town in Montague County.

Army Captain Randolph Marcy camped here with his surveying crew

in 1849 as they mapped out the southern route of the famous Santa Fe Trail.

Saint Jo was the western edge of western settlements. Indian raids in the area are documented history. The Chisholm Trail brought drovers to town as their herds were bedded and watered just south of town. In 1871 seven stores called Saint Jo home. Five of those merchants sold whiskey!

In 1873 the town was renamed Saint Jo after its founder, Joseph Anderson Howell.

It was perhaps Mr. Howell's abstinence

from alcohol that garnered the town's name, Saint Jo.

1873 was also the year that the Stonewall Saloon was built and would become the predominate stopping point for drovers who wanted to quench their thirst. While others

'wet their whistle' in Spanish Fort to the northwest.

Saint Jo was the last stop on the trail that would take the cattle drives north to Red River Station and the Chisholm Trail through Indian Territory and on to the Kansas railheads.

Nocona came to be when D.C. Jordan and William Broadus located their cattle ranch here in 1873. Mr. Jordan donated one square mile of land for a town site, and in 1887 the town was platted and named after Peta Nocona, the father of the famous Comanche Chief, Quanah Parker. Both Nocona and Saint Jo were ideally situated near the main Red River crossing on the famous Chisholm Trail. Thus they were principal gateways to the Chickasaw Nation, rich in the grasslands necessary for the cattle drives north.

Nocona was once known as the "Leather Goods Center of the Southwest." H.J. Justin moved his cowboy boot manufacturing business from Spanish Fort to Nocona in 1887 with the coming of the Gainesville & Henrietta Railway, and formed H.J. Justin & Sons.

In 1925 Justin's sons moved the company to Fort Worth as Justin Boots, which resulted in daughter Enid forming her own boot-making business, Nocona Boot Company. In 1926

Justin Leather Goods opened in Nocona specialized in the production of small leather items such as coin purses and key holders.

Nocona Leather Goods was also formed, making billfolds and purses. Hard times in 1929 forced the company to reorganize as Nocona Athletic Goods/Nokona, making football, baseball, and other sporting equipment. By 1943 the Company had added the trademark "Nokona" and its Indian head logo.

Today boot-making and ball glove manufacturing are still alive and well, with Fenoglio Boot Company and Nokona All-American Ballglove the area's manufacturing cornerstones.

Cattle-raising has been important to the area since the very beginning, and several large cattle operations endure today. Cotton farming was big business right after the turn of the 19th Century, and agriculture surged again in

1937 when a fruit research station was created in nearby Montague. Oil was discovered in the area in 1919, and by 1922 oil as a major industry was well on its way. Today, the Barnett Shale natural gas deposit is a major source of area employment.

The Tales 'n' Trails Museum in Nocona opened in 2010 focusing its exhibits and

collections on five primary themes -- Native American inhabitation of the region, Western Heritage, Agriculture, Leathergoods, and Oil and Gas.

In 2013 the museum dedicated its Native American Hall emphasizing the more than

10,000 year residency of the area by Native Americans; and in 2020 opened its Western Heritage exhibit complete with an animotronic Miss Enid who in her own voice tells the story of the founding of

Tour Historic Saint Jo

Two-step your way around Saint Jo's Chisholm Trail Square and find everything you need for the perfect weekend getaway.

First, book your visit at one of these unique options that will fit your need, no matter what the size of your group: the Rock House Overnight Stay, Robin's Nest, A&A Acres, the Blue Ostrich Guest House, and don't pass up High Cotton Cottage. Now, get ready for a day filled with lots of things to do!

Trailtown Treasures just might have that collectible you've been looking for. This group of vendors brings together handmade treasures and other finds you won't want to miss.

Keep walking north from Trailtown and you'll see our beautifully restored Texas Theater. Originally established in the 1930's, it has been carefully recrafted with state-of-the-art video and sound. The Theater features both current and classic movies each week.

Panache is straight on down the street. Originally located in an old hardware store, last year they expanded into the building next door and will reopen March 5 with twice the space. This Texas Monthly "must see" is full of fun candles, clothing, home décor and more. Meeting the proprietor is alone worth the stop. Be sure and tell Lynne hello!

The Stonewall Saloon Museum is next on

your stroll around town. This restored watering hole from yesteryear brings the past to life. The second floor will have you telling the tales of just what went on up there abound. But don't

worry, tastefully done and full of history, you will find yourself immersed in the life of the area when the west was "being won." So, come on in, "belly up to the bar" and have a sarsaparilla!

Mike Karnes Bootmaker is just down the street.

Along with the late Carl Chappell, these two gentlemen are award-winning crafters of custom boots. With a long waiting list, their boots are one of a kind masterpieces. Stop by, enjoy the smell of leather and a conversation with these true western artisans.

Cowgirl Hall of Fame inductee Donna Howell-Sickles calls Saint Jo home ,and her gallery and gift shop are your next stop. Step inside this historically restored building and enjoy a collection of artists that represent a

Besides authentic barbecue, Red River Station BBQ has also become a burgoning venue for musical entertainment throughout the year whether inside in an acoutstical setting or outdoors on their music under the

wide variety of genres from traditional to contemporary. Their mediums are paint, wood, metal and more. Step in next door and delight in a collection of gifts for you and your home.

Peek inside the next building as Donna's husband has lovingly restored another building that houses a collection of vehicles ranging from a mint condition Indian motorcycle to a classic '57 Chevy.

At the corner is one of the newer additions to Saint Jo, the International Artillery Museum. The 20,000 square foot building houses the largest privately owned collection of military equipment in the United States.

Equipment from the United States, Great Britain, Germany, Japan and Russia from WWII, Korea, Vietnam, and the Middle East are all here waiting for you. While all are decommissioned, they still have their battle scars and the stories they tell are fascinating.

Stroll on down the street and you will find The Vintage Market. Housed in an old gas station, it is one of the first buildings to greet you when you first come to town from the east. Recently expanding into the old Post Office, you will be delighted with all the finds here. More fun clothing and unique accessories that only small boutiques carry.

Time for something to eat? Of course, you have options! We just happen to have the best Dairy Queen around! Lazy Heart Grill will satisfy your hunger for a variety of great foods, but make sure you save room for dessert. If it's Tex-Mex, The Burrito Shop has a lot more than just burritos, and if its breakfast you are after — you found the place. You can't leave town without a little BBQ! The Red River Station BBQ can help you there and their music in the evenings is just magic. If you need one of those hamburgers like you remember growing up - you know the one, it just melts in your mouth — then the Windmill Grill will fill the bill and you will so enjoy the venue here!



A new addition to Saint Jo, and the start of what owner Craig Ogden hopes will become a Memorial Park to veterans, is the TracNavel 5" 38 Caliber Deck Gun located just west of the

Saint Jo Square. The gun was the most commonly used mid-sized naval gun used in World War II through the Cold War. Thousands were mounted in turrets and open mounts of armed merchant ships, like the example in Saint Jo which was manufactured in 1943.

Tour Historic Nocona

With a rich history centering around cowboys and Indians, oil and leathergoods, agriculture and industry, Nocona is rapidly become a "destination" complete with museums -- from cowboys and Indians to football, baseball and classic cars -- as well as quaint, unique lodging, a brewery and more.

What started out as an Eagle Scout Project for Joseph Storey in 2010, the Tour Historic Nocona Project, soon gained a life of its own.

The project was designed to identify unique and historic homes and buildings in Nocona. Along with his fellow Scouts, Joseph had fifteen metal arrowheads fabricated. They erected these markers on poles in the front of locations around town chosen in conjunction with the Nocona Chamber of Commerce as an Historic Driving Tour. Now the project marks thirty-six locations on the Tour.

In 2013 the Nocona Chamber of Commerce developed a booklet called "Visit Historic Nocona" featuring the descriptions and a map of the locations, businesses, and homes marked by the wayfaring markers along the driving tour.

This booklet is for sale through the Gift Shop at the Tales'n'Trails Museum.

One of the most noted sites on the Driving Tour is the beautiful, historic, 125-year-old Central Christian Church, located at the corner of Cooke and East Elm Streets.

A landmark church built in the shape of a cross, or "Carpenter Gothic" design, with its bell tower pointing toward the heavens, it is touted as the oldest congregation and church building in the community. Central boasts a Texas Historical Marker, and yet still

congregation which meets regularly for worship, study, and mission projects.

Formed in 1888, meetings have been held in the sanctuary of this building since 1894. The unique architecture of the worship center is appealing to those who come through the doors, and yet the spirit of the building calls one to reverence of the Holy and to movement outside the old clapboard walls into the mission to which Christians are called.

One of the most unique structures in Nocona is Eclectic Collectibles, located at 208 Clay Street, for decades the structure was home to Parr's Barbershop. Originally constructed in 1893, it is the second oldest

The Molly Love Room is one of the rooms in Red River Station Inn which features Nocona's rich history and its people. building in Nocona. The structure was refaced duplicating the front as shown in an 1895 photograph. The interior is highligted by the rare, handpainted, glass advertisements on the wall. A second story apartment was added by the current owners. The antique store is open Fridays and Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Renovation, restoration and recreation is the common architectural theme for buildings in Nocona.

What was original the Farmers & Merchants National Bank was restored into seperate store fronts and currently serves as the Nocona School District's administration building.

Next door, Rusty and Carolyn Fenoglio have renovated and restored two buildings to house Gibbs Drug Store, Beau Jolee Boutique and The Orange Giraffe. They also have renovated an adjoining building into their own, personal movie venue.

Across the street, Bob and Kristal Ferguson have created a unique, one of a kind lodging for visitors to Nocona in the Red River Station Inn. Each of their rooms is decorated to a theme -- Peta Nocona, Enid Justin, Mose Johnson, Jack Crain, H.J. Justin and more -- each room dipictes each individual's unique historical ties to Nocona and Montague County.

Next door is Red River Station Pizzeria -- which is NOT your typical pizza parlor created by Theresa and Tony Dirker.

Even the City of Nocona has gotten into the renovation, restorating effort by restoring and reconstructing the original H.J. Justin & Son's boot factory into the H.J. Justin Community Room complete and public restrooms. And the north part of the building is currently being renovated into new city offices as "city hall" moves to the town's main street next door to the Mary Beckman Davis Downtown Park.

Along U.S. Highway 82 are more buildings which have restored and repurposed.

The largest such project was the purchase of the old Nocona Boot Company factory on East U.S. Highway 82 by Craig and Leigha Carter. Now it is home to Nocona Beer & Brewery -- the vision of Dr. Ken Kollmyeer -- as well as the new home for Nokona American Baseball Glove factory and museum.

On the east edge of Nocona is the Tales'n' Trails Museum located at the intersection of the old Highway 5 wagon road between Nocona and Saint Jo and the Montague to Spanish Fort road. Once those were literally wagon paths between the county seat and what was once, during the days of the Chisholm Trail, a rip roaring cowboy town.

Then there is the Horton Classic Car Museum



Mardi Gras, Nocona Style



Nocona may seem a long way from New Orleans, but the spirit of Mardi Gras is alive and well in Nocona. Hosted by the Chamber of Commerce, Mardi Gras comes to town each February as a three-day Cajun festival with vendors, Cajun music, food, and lots of family-friendly fun.

Decorated to the nines in purple, green, and gold, the whole town gets into the spirit. The festival kicks off with a costumed Krewe de Barkus dog parade on Thursday and a parade of colorfully decorated ATVs on Friday. Saturday begins with a 5K Fun Run followed by the children's Shoe Box Parade and then a Kiddie Parade. Those lead to the grande finale the Mardi Gras — Nocona Style Parade on Saturday afternoon.

Then all of this is mixed with Cajun food, vendors and music, of course there will be music, at multiple locations across Nocona which lures thousands of people to town each year.

Spring and Fall bring an outrageous event to the Saint Jo area as Rednecks with Paychecks (RWP) holds an event like no other. It has been described as a four-day party of sanctioned mud races, ATV and Jeep trails, rock crawling and live music, all on over 1,000 acres just south of Saint Jo. The legendary "Back 40" features four mud pits, creek runs, canyons, and a side-by-side track.

Organizer Derrick Morse and friends received national attention during hurricane Harvey when they helped rescue stranded residents (and a National Guard 6by6!) with their monster trucks with special recognition by President Trump and his wife Melania in Houston.

RWP also hosts Operation Santa with a truck show, auction, and live music by artists such as Nocona's Tanner Fenoglio and Stoney Larue to raise money for toys for the children of Montague and Cooke Counties.

Rednecks with Paychecks is an 18 & older event and photo ID is required.




Montague North Field

Between Nocona and the Red River lies the Montague County North Field. Scattered like large, mechanical black and brown ants across the sloping terrain of the Red River Valley motorists can see scores of pump jacks deliberately extracting oil from this field. While by no means is it the only oil field in the North Texas Hill Country a drive through the North Field grants grand vistas of the Red River Valley.

First opened in 1922, there are still some wells producing oil seven, eight and nine decades after they were first drilled!

And on occasion you might see a bit of 'art' attached to the top of a pump jack. While at one time there was a Snoopy, and a Tweetie Bird, now all that which has withstood the the fierce Texas winds is a Rabbit. See if you can find it.



2021 The Great Race



The Great Race stopped in Franklin Ind., in 2017

Nocona, Texas, has been added as an overnight promotional stop on the 2021 Hemmings Motor News Great Race presented by Hagerty on Sunday, June 20, race organizers have announced.

The Great Race, the world's premiere old car rally, will bring 120 of the world's finest antique automobiles to town for the \$150,000 event, with the first car rolling into downtown starting at 4:15 p.m. Nocona, which is known as the Classic Car Capital of Texas, is also home to the Horton Classic Car Museum.

Former Great Racers Pete and Barbara Vicari are property owners in Nocona and along with friends Pete and Barbara Horton have played a vital role in the development of downtown Nocona through the years.

"We are very excited to finally be able to bring the Great Race to Nocona," Great Race director Jeff Stumb said.

"Many people have lobbied me for years to bring the event to town, and the enthusiasm from the Mayor's office to the Chamber of Commerce to the Horton Classic Car Museum made it an easy decision."

The stop will replace the overnight promotion scheduled for downtown Ardmore, Okla., but the folks in that area will still be able to see and greet the racers as they arrive at the hotels next to the Ardmore Convention Center starting around 8:30 p.m. that same evening.

In all, the participants in the event will cover more than 2,300 miles in 9 days. The start will be in front of the Alamo in San Antonio, on June 19. The race will finish June 27 in Greenville, S.C.

Teams and cars from Japan, England,

Germany, Canada and every corner of the United States will be participating in their intage automobiles dating back as far as 1916.

"There are more than 500 people just in our entourage from all around the world taking part in this incredible adventure," director Jeff Stumb said.

Along the route, competitors will travel through 10 states — Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina.

The Great Race, which began 38 years ago, is not a speed race, but a time/speed/distance rally.

The vehicles, each with a driver and navigator, are given precise instructions each day that detail every move down to the second. They are scored at secret check points along the way and are penalized one second for each second either early or late. As in golf, the lowest score wins.

Cars start — and hopefully finish — one minute apart if all goes according to plan. The biggest part of the challenge other than staying on time and following the instructions is getting an old car to the finish line each day, organizers say.

Each stop on the Great Race is free to the public and spectators will be able to visit with the participants and to look at the cars for several hours. It is common for kids to climb in the cars for a first-hand look.

Cars built in 1974 and earlier are eligible, with most entries having been manufactured before World War II. In the 2019 Great Race from Riverside, Calif., to Tacoma, Wash., a 1916 Hudson won the event when it crossed the finish line at America's Car Museum. That vehicle was driven by Howard Sharp of Fairport, N.Y., and navigated by his son Doug. They won \$50,000 for finishing first overall.

A 1916 Hudson Pikes Peak Hillclimber, a 1917 Peerless Racer and a chain-driven 1918 American LaFrance Speedster are the oldest cars scheduled to be in the 2021 Great Race. The winners will again receive \$50,000 of the \$150,000 total purse.

Over the decades, the Great Race has stopped in hundreds of cities big and small, from tiny Austin, Nev., to New York City.

"When the Great Race pulls into a city it becomes an instant festival," Stumb said. "Last year we had a couple of overnight stops with more than 10,000 spectators on our way to having 250,000 people see the Great Race during the event."

The event was started in 1983 by Tom McRae and it takes its name from the 1965 movie, The Great Race, which starred Tony Curtis, Jack Lemmon, Natalie Wood and Peter Falk. The movie is a comedy based on the real life 1908 automobile race from New York to Paris. In 2004, Tony Curtis was the guest of the Great Race and rode in his car from the movie, the Leslie Special.

The Great Race gained a huge following from late night showings on ESPN when the network was just starting out in the early 1980s. The first entrant, Curtis Graf of Irving, Texas, is still a participant today.

The event's main sponsors are Hemmings Motor News, Hagerty, Coker Tire and Reliable Carriers.





Chisholm Trail Round-up Rodeo

Beginning in 1952, Nocona has celebrated its western heritage with the annual Chisholm Trail Round-up Rodeo.

Coordinated by the Nocona Rodeo Committee, sanctioned by



the UPRA and TCRA, the rodeo is held the first Friday and Saturday in June. Visitors can enjoy two nights of rodeo action at the Chisholm Trail Rodeo Arena (734 Montague St.).

In 2020 the Chisholm Trail Rodeo extended into three days of rodeo, plus slack, resulting in having the 2nd highest payout (\$97,490) to participants out of 433 UPRA events in Texas. The event draws many participants competing for prize money in all the traditional events.

There's mutton bustin' for the little cowpokes, and a Rodeo Queen and Princess contest. The big Rodeo Parade winds through downtown Nocona, with community organizations, school bands, and clubs participating alongside horses and riders, cars and floats.

Saint Jo Rodeo

The Saint Jo Riding Club's annual rodeo is something of history. With over 60 years of cowboys, broncs, bulls, barrel racing and calf roping, you will find top rodeo action during the 2-day event in August.

The arena, located just east of Saint Jo along Highway 82 is up close and personal. The mutton bustin' for the next generation of cowboys is always a crowd favorite. The rodeo parade on Saturday, circles the historic Chisholm Trail Square and features floats, equestrian and riding clubs, along with individual entries.

The club hosts a Rodeo Queen, Junior Queen and Princess contest for cowgirls in the area. A recent winner just happened to become Miss Rodeo Oklahoma!

Bullfest

The Annual Bullfest is held each May at the Nocona Chisholm Trail Rodeo Arena, 734 Montague St. The event includes mutton bustin', a children's calf scramble, a women's steer scramble and the always hilarious donkey race, in addition to the main event of bull riding.

Sponsored by the Big L Rodeo Company, this rodeo event features professional bull riders from Texas and other states. The concession supports Nocona's Lions Club's community projects and scholarship fund.





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4th of July on Lake Nocona



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The Old Chisholm Trail

Few events in history have had as much impact on north Texas as did the Chisholm Trail.

By the end of the Civil War, Texas was in dire straights, and Montague County was sparsely populated. At the same time a glut of many as five million cattle existed in the state, but there was virtually no viable way to get them to market in the eastern United States where beef prices were high.

Cattle buyer and entrepreneur Joseph McCoy changed that.

In 1867 McCoy established a railhead and cattle pens in Abilene, Kansas, and set out to convince cattlemen in Texas to trail their herds north through Indian Territory to Abilene to be shipped east to feed the masses. The first year, McCoy shipped 36,000 head of cattle by rail, still less than one percent of Texas' total supply. His business doubled each year

until 1871, when nearly 600,000 head of cattle glutted the market.

It is estimated that five million head of cattle and a million mustangs crossed the Red River entering the Indian Territory at Red River Station in Montague County on their way to various towns in Kansas and points further north and further west as the railheads moved westward.


Cattle were gathered as far south as Mexico beginning in February, or March, and headed north through all parts of Texas not controlled by the Comanche and Kiowa. It took cattle leaving the southern part of the state from six weeks to two months to cross Texas. Red River Station was a primary crossing point into Indian Territory and was widely used from 1867 until around 1882. Once across the river, it took another four weeks or more to move a herd across Indian Territory into Kansas. The Red River Station Cemetery is the only physical landmark of the trail the cattle trod.

It is nearly impossible to imagine the sight, sound and smell of so many cattle passing through Montague County. There are many accounts telling of herd after herd after herd, one right after another like cars in a freight train, waiting their turn to cross the Red River.


One can learn more about this great migration and its impact on the growth of Montague County by visiting the Tales 'N' Trails Museum in Nocona and the Stonewall Saloon Museum in Saint Jo. For those wanting to retrace the trail, the Montague County Historical Commission in conjunction with Texas Lakes Trails have placed concrete markers at thirteen different locations throughout the county and a guide helps explain the importance of each site. Chisholm Trail Markers





Horton Classic Car Museum

"The Classic Car Capital of Texas"

The Horton Classic Car Museum, 115 W. Walnut St. Nocona, is housed in what was once the town's Ford

dealership. Over 40 Corvettes are a part of the collection, featuring nearly every year of production between 1953 and 1978. The collection also features several 1950's Senior Award Winners from Chevy and Pontiac Nationals. Different models of Chevrolets, Fords, Pontiacs, Packards, Plymouths, and even a Studebaker. The collection is always growing.

The main Museum building currently houses around sixty-five vehicles of several different makes and models, including thirty-two Corvettes in the 18,500 square feet of space. The Museum's collection features a 1962 Ford Thunderbird Sports, a 1948 Lincoln Continental Club Coupe, a 1958 Pontiac Bonneville Series 25 Convertible. The building itself was constructed around 1922 and was home to the Shackelford Motor Company. It spent several years as a grocery store and later a lumberyard storage building before being restored by the Hortons into a world-class Car Museum.

The Horton Motor Company, 113 E. Elm. St., Nocona, currently houses sixteen Classic Cars, including a 1968 ShelbyGT-500 Cobra Mustang signed by Carroll Shelby, a 1965 Chevy Chevelle SS Malibu Z-16, and a 1970 Plymouth Hemi-Cuda Tribute Convertible. This building was constructed some time in 1925 and has had a long association with Automobiles and originally was

home of the Humphey-Maddox Chevrolet Dealership. During World War II the dealership re-opened as John Stager Chevrolet. From 1954 until 1959, it was the Cecil Matheson Chevrolet Dealership. It later

became a hardware store, and a dry-cleaning establishment before being restored by the Hortons in 2011 to house part of the family's Classic Car Collection.

To put it into perspective, the total horsepower of all the Horton Class Museum is 46,347 hp that equates to over 46 megawatts, enough to power over

twenty-three thousand homes! Billy Dean Dobbs is the Museum Director responsible for maintaining and showcasing the Horton's extensive car collection. Billy has a seemingly endless

knowledge of every aspect of the cars in the Horton's collection.

Tales 'n' Trails Museum

Founded as the county's first museum in 1994, the Tales 'n' Trails Museum in Nocona opened in 2010. The 6,400 square foot museum has a true Texas feel.

The 9,300 square foot Millard Fillmore Ball Agricultural Center will house the museum's always changing agricultural exhibits. It will further expand the stories being told.

Begun in 2018, the Western Heritage and Leathergoods exhibits was scheduled to open in March of 2020, but was delayed until fall. When it opened it included an animatronic

presentation of Miss Enid Justin.

The Native American Hall highlights the extensive Native American artifacts from the original Joe Benton Collection, one of the most extensive private collections in the country. Among the highlights of the exhibit is an extensive collection of locally uncovered Clovis

and Folsum era points as well as six, unique, 6,000-year-old, ceremonial projectile points ranging in size up to 6-1/2-inches.

Exhibits include two of Del Motley's massive, leathercarved religious artwork, "The Good Shepherd" and "The Last Supper."

Other exhibits include a fully functional, one-sixth scale 1924 Fort Worth Spudder; the donation of a restored 400-600 year old Native American pot; and the John Glaze exhibit on boot making, which includes an extensive research archive on the craft dating from 1800.

The museum also conducts special exhibits

and activities throughout the year held in conjunction with community events. Children have fun at the History Mystery Summer Camp each June as they get hands-on experiences of the area's rich history ranging from how the first peoples lived to life on a working ranch and driving cattle up the Chisholm Trail.

For the adults, guests enjoy a rousing time at the annual Shebang! Fundraiser, held each September.



The Tales 'n' Trails Museum is open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday by appointment. Admission is \$5 per adult, or \$3 for senior citizens and dents. Active duty military personnel, firemen, police, and veterans are all admitted free with valid I.D., as well as preschoolers accompanied by an adult or Museum members.

The Museum also features custom framing from master

The Stonewall Saloon was built in 1873 by Irb H. Boggess and was the first building to be erected in the town. The Saloon was operated under the title of Boggess and Fulton and later dubbed The Stonewall Saloon. Peg Leg Fulton was the operator of the Saloon.

According to stories told, the saloon was opened to accommodate the thirsty trail drovers, traveling on long cattle drives, headed to the Red River Station on the Chisholm Trail. A boarding house was upstairs.

Prohibition came to the

county in 1897, and the saloon closed on Feb. 11, 1899. In 1902, the building was being used as a restaurant. For a time, Mr. Boggess used the building as his real estate office. In 1905, James R. Wiley bought the building from Boggess and established the Citizens National Bank. He added a vault and modernized the front facade of the building with a large picture window. By the end of

the depression, the town was no longer able to support two banks. In 1942, the owner of the competing bank, H.D. Field Sr., purchased and dissolved the Citizens Bank

The building stayed in the Field estate and was rented for offices. For the next few years the old saloon building was used for various commercial enterprises including a doctor's office upstairs and a real estate business. It was the headquarters of the Kingery Brothers Oil Company for many years.

In the 1950's, H.D. Field Jr., purchased the building and restored it to a replica of the original saloon. A large ornate mirrored back bar was purchased and hauled in from Floresville, Texas. Swinging doors were added that sported area rancher's and farmer's brands. Families donated items to be displayed in the new museum. It was opened in 1958 as the Stonewall Saloon Museum, the year of Saint Jo's Centennial celebration. It became a major tourist attraction and landmark for the small town. Stucco was applied to the exterior of the building at some point in the mid-1960s.

In 1964 the Texas Historical Survey Committee awarded a historical marker to the building. During its years as a museum, citizens served as curators. The museum was sold by the Fields family in 1996, and the new owners again operated it as a replica of an old-time saloon open for occasions.

In February 2011, the building was purchased by locals and the property put into a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation with the intent of establishing a first class museum depicting the early days of Saint Jo, Head of Elm, and the intersection of the Chisholm Trail and the California Trail.

Donations from within the community resulted in the ability to restore the structural integrity of the original building at a cost of just over \$100,000. Time had taken its toll on the building requiring major repairs including replacing the roof, re-mortaring the stone walls, replacing the flooring, windows and interior decor. A structural engineer and a historical architect were employed for advice on the proper approach to restore the old building.

As layers of history were removed from the walls of the building, a mural was discovered. Johnny Langer, a historical art conservator from Galveston's paint conservation studio, was contacted and dated the mural to mid-1870, the first decorations on the walls. The discovered mural included urns with flowers and reeds painted on both sides of the bar. Connecting the two urns was a fringed curtain draped above the original back bar. Langer related that traveling artists commonly decorated the walls of buildings and courthouses in that era. He directed techniques to reveal the preserve it, recreate the mural and provided advice about the original colors of the building's interior. Local artist, Joel Hale, made tracings of the artwork and recreated it after the renovation of the saloon walls were completed.

The first phase secured the integrity of the building and renovated the old saloon portion downstairs. The museum was open to

visitors the first weekend in August, 2011. Over 2,600 visitors from 38 states and 11 countries have stopped by to see the museum since then. Many of the artifacts from the 1958 Centennial museum are on display.

The second phase was a two-story addition on the back of the original building. It added central heat and air, bathrooms and a staircase to the second floor and an area for an elevator when funds are available.

No two Nokona gloves are identical, and each has its own identity and feel.

Its factory was destroyed by fire in 2006 causing the factory to utilize the original location for Nocona Boot Company for a time. In 2018 the firm moved into newly renovated manufacturing space located in The Old Nocona Boot Factory. The location includes an expanded retail store plus an on-site museum which tells the history of the only baseball glove still made in the U.S.A.



Wineries

Located north and east of Saint Jo lie three wineries which are rapidly establishing themselves among wine aficionados.

Family owned and operated the Blue Ostrich Winery & Vineyard was once one of the foremost ostrich breeding and ranching facilities in the southwest. The structure that houses the winery, tasting room and corporate offices was once filled with ostrich eggs, chicks and fledglings.

The acreage to the west that nurtures Tempranillo, Viognier and Cabernet grapevines was the same hillside where hundreds of ostriches roamed during the 1980s and 1990s. As the Fredrick family's ostrich ranching adventure drew to a close, the future of the last seven birds remained uncertain — until a name for the new winery and vineyard was needed. Today the ostrich not only adorns the Blue Ostrich label, but the birds also function as official winery mascots, welcoming guests to the beautiful Red River Valley.

Blue Ostrich Winery & Vineyard is located eight and a half miles north of Saint Jo on FM 2382. Operating hours vary by season, so please call the winery for current operating hours or for tour information: (940) 995-3100 or visit their website: www.blueostrich.net.

One valley to the west lies *Arché* (pronounced"R-K"), family owned and operated by Howard and Amy Davies with their son, Grayson, as Winemaker. The family started growing grapes under the name of Oak Creek Vineyards in 1999, the first commercial wine-grape vineyard in Montague

County. After several years of selling their grapes to other Texas wineries, the Davies established their own winery, Arché, in 2007. Arché means "beginning or origin."

The winery currently produces about 1,500 cases per year with most being from the grapes they grow with additional grapes sourced from other select Texas vinyards. Arche's award-winning wines include white and red varieties and blends. Arché is located six miles north of Saint Jo off



City Parks

Nocona has two city parks with at third under development. The Enid Justin Park at the corner of Paris and Mesquite Streets offers a very large playground with lots of equipment for the kids to enjoy, a skateboard ramp, picnic area, and a walking/ jogging trail. ground equipment, a basketball court, and baseball and softball fields. Boggess Park hosts the city's Fourth of July Celebration each year.

In 2017 a group of young parents decided to enhance the Enid Justin City Park undertaking an 18-month, \$250,000 project to construct a state-of-the-art playground for children from toddlers on up.

largemouth bass, flathead catfish, blue catfish, and crappie! And once upon a time it hosted muskie, with the state record coming from the lake.





The Fenoglios have completely renovated the family home which now serves as a bed and breakfast rented through The Veranda Inn.

The Fenoglios are not finished, they rcently completed the Veranda Hide-a-ways, 20 extended-stay rooms constructed on a small creek behind the Veranda Event Center.

Taovayas Indian Bridge

Located north of both Nocona and Saint Jo. the Taovayas Indian Bridge was built in the 1990s to replace, after a half century, five bridges and two ferries which bridged the Red River between Texas and Oklahoma.

In 1994 the Texas and Oklahoma Departments of Transportation held dedication ceremonies for the Taovayas Indian Bridge.

The Taovayas were the largest clan of the Wichita who lived on both sides of the river in the area of Spanish Fort in the 18th century and stopped Spanish expansion to the north. The Nocona Chamber recommended the name, and members of the Wichita & Affiliated Tribes took part in the dedication including blessing the bridge.

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
