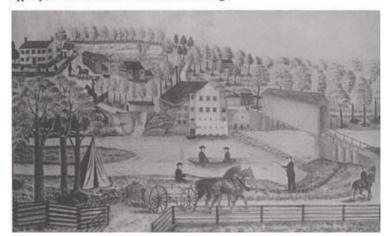


22-6. Noser's Mill, pencil sketch by Philip Gerber, Franklin County, ca. 1885. Upper left, is the miller's house and various farm buildings.

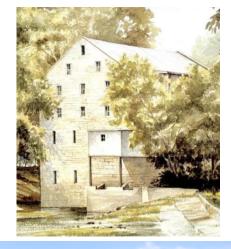


Nestled along the banks of the Bourbeuse River stands a remarkable four-story Federal-style limestone home, originally constructed between 1849 and 1851 by German immigrant Dietrich F. Voss. With skilled stonemasons working for just 50 cents a day, Voss created a residence that still turns heads today—its dramatic stone façade, double-gallery porches, 10-foot-wide center halls, and multiple fireplaces (gracing nearly every room) echo with timeless craftsmanship and character.

But this home was just the beginning. Voss also built the very first gristmill on the Bourbeuse River, known later as Voss Mill. It quickly became a cornerstone of rural life, grinding grain, processing lumber, and serving as a bustling center for local commerce.

Dietrich F. Voss ran the Grist Mill until sometime after the Civil War. He then sold his Milling operation and his home to John Noser. John Noser was a Swiss imigrant and he along with another partner purchased the Milling operation in 1871. In 1877 the County Newspaper reported that the Mill was busy and running three sets of Grinding Burrs and in addition a Wool Curding Machine. It wasn't until the 1890s that a Saw Mill was then added. The mill served local farmers, grinding grain and processing lumber, becoming a vital hub for commerce in the rural region.

Around the 1870s, the property changed hands to John J. Noser, who significantly expanded its operations. The mill's renaming to Noser Mill coincided with the establishment of a post office under that name.
