This affords another layer of privacy and security with trees. After the conservation easement, the landowners enrolled 55 acres in a program run by The VA Department of Environmental Quality. The newly planted 30,000 trees would filter groundwater runoff preventing nutrient "pollution" (fertilizer) from entering Blue Run, an ecological bonus.
